All orders must be picked up on Saturday, May 1, 2010 between 9am and Noon in Williston or Berlin.

t the Tree Sale, all trees and shrubs (except blueberries) will come as bare root. Bare root means that the plants are dug and stored without any soil around their roots.

What are the advantages of planting bare root trees?

- More root mass. Bare root trees can have up to 200% more roots than container trees, depending on the soil and transplanting history at the nursery.
- Lower cost. Without extra labor and materials, bare root trees cost both the seller and buyer less.
- **Easier planting**. A young tree without soil weighs little, so it's easy to move and plant.

There must be some disadvantages!

• Less flexibility. Once they leave the nursery, bare root trees should be planted within a week. Without soil, the roots can dry out and die if left exposed.

- Narrower planting window. Bare root trees need good soil moisture, so mid spring (before budbreak) and mid fall (after leaf fall) are the only two possible planting times.
- Restricted availability. Not all species are available as bare root stock.

Other bare root tips and techniques:

- Use any technique you can to reduce the time the tree roots are bare.
- If possible, dip tree roots in a slurry of a hydrogel (a synthetic water-absorbing compound, many brands available) or muddy water, then store them in large, plastic bags until planting.
- Keep trees covered, shaded, and moist until planting.

LAKE RE-LEAF: ENHANCING NATIVE VEGETATION ON A LAKESHORE

Planted shores provide privacy; scenic beauty; shore stability; wild-life and shallow water habitat (in-lake); and filtration of pollutants. All these benefits can only be realized if native plants are growing along your lakeshore, so plant a vegetative buffer today!

Choosing Species

Assess the wetness of your shore before deciding what to plant; some shores at the same level as the lake are quite wet, but if there is a bank a few feet high, the soils can be surprisingly dry. Look for native species growing on undeveloped shores for ideas of what might grow well on your frontage.

The Winooski Conservation District offers these species that do well in a variety of conditions:

Red maple Red osier dogwood Snowberry White birch Blueberry White cedar Buttonbush

Arranging Plants

If you have lawn to the water's edge, plant a strip along the areas least used for lake access. For instance, planting 60 feet of a 100

foot frontage would still leave 40 feet of access to your dock or swimming area. Re-vegetating an area should extend as wide as possible, but even a 15 foot buffer width is more beneficial than lawn.

Plant trees 10-12 feet apart, and shrubs five feet from trees or other shrubs. As the plants grow, they can be pruned to maintain a view; keep the tops of shrubs at a desired height and only prune the lower branches of trees for a "keyhole" view. Leave the decomposing vegetation, known as the duff layer, on the ground as it is essential for filtering polluted run-off, and nourishing and protecting the rooted plants.

Don't mow or rake around your plantings, although a mulch layer might be a good idea for a few years until the new plants establish themselves.

USING NATIVE PLANTS FOR BEAUTY, BEES, BUTTERFLIES AND BIRDS

Want to support wildlife? Go native! Butterflies and moths require native plants to serve as host plants for their larval caterpillar stage. Nectar filled flowers provide food for butterflies, bees and hummingbirds. Native trees and shrubs make the perfect protective cover for overwintering birds and migrants looking for nutrient packed nuts and fruits and protein rich insects and spiders. To get you started, here's how some of the shrubs you can buy through Winooski NRCD's 2010 Tree Sale benefit insects and birds.

Plant Species	Benefits to Insects	Benefits to Birds
buttonbush	The promethea moth relies on buttonbush as a larval host plant.	Green-winged teal and wood duck use for cover and seeds for food. Ruby-throated hummingbirds feast on the nectar.
winterberry	Attracts bees and flies.	Flickers, thrushes, Cedar Waxwings and other fruit eaters feast on the berries. Thrushes nest in the foliage.
red osier dogwood	Bees and other insects use flowers for pollen. Spring azures like all dogwoods.	Fruits are a preferred food source for northern flickers, downy woodpeckers, Cedar Waxwings, Song sparrows, and others.
Allegheny serviceberry	Swallowtail use as larval host plants.	Tanagers, thrushes, cedar waxwings, Baltimore orioles, cardinals, rose-breasted grosbeaks and wrens relish the berries. Thrushes and kingbirds use serviceberry for cover and nesting.
common snowberry	Snowberry clearwing and Hummingbird clearwing hover while imbibing the nectar.	Winter food for cedar waxwing, pine & evening grosbeak.
nannyberry	Attracts spring azure and Hummingbird clearwing moth.	The fruits of nannyberry are an excellent source of food good for many migrating songbirds.
